NELLES MANOR MUSEUM

Nelles Manor Museum is operated by Nelles Manor Heritage House, a non-profit charitable organization.

We present Nelles Manor, a **1798** Georgian style home built by United Empire Loyalist **Robert Nelles** from local materials.

The Manor opened as a museum in 2016 and represents the history of the Nelles Family who through their involvement in early government and military service plus their extensive early trade and commerce helped to build Canada as an early Nation.

The site of the home is also the site of the Engagement at the Forty in the War of 1812 that may have been an important part in the destiny of Ontario and Canada.



Red Dress Day - May 5

Inspired by the work of Métis artist Jaime Black that would go on to spark the REDress Project, this day draws attention to the more than 1,000 Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG) in Canada. The project was started in 2010 after Black displayed an installation at the University of Winnipeg that included a series of empty red dresses to honour and symbolize the lost lives of Indigenous women at the hands of violence. On this day, participants are encouraged to display empty red dresses in public spaces or wear red dresses to show support for the lives of MMIWG. Additional activities taking place on this day include also marches, memorials, and walks across Canada. Installations of red dresses are displayed in museums, university campus.

Welcome Back Clara!

Nelles Manor Museum is so happy to welcome back summer student Clara Falconier as our Collections Assistant. She will continue cataloguing the museum's artifacts and assist with tours.

My favorite Nelles Manor Museum artifact is the spring driven roasting jack hanging over the fireplace in the Hearth Kitchen.



Rotisserie cooking became common in the Middle Ages, particularly in large households; this was likely because spit roasting allows for numerous cuts of meat to be cooked all at once. The downside to Rotisserie cooking was the hard manual labour required in turning a spit. There were workers in medieval kitchens who were called "spit boys" whose job was dedicated to manually turning the spits. It was extremely grueling and hot work, as they would be forced to rotate a spit over a fire for hours. The "spit boy" position was seen as one of the worst jobs in a medieval kitchen, and devices were soon made to make the "spit boys" obsolete.

At first, they got rid of the need for human labor by attaching hamster wheels to the spits, which were turned by small dogs. These dog-wheeled Rotisseries became so popular that dog breeds like the "Vernepator Cur" were created especially for turning spits. Afterwards, they began making completely mechanized spits with weight driven roasting jacks, which used a series of weights, ropes, and gears to self-turn. While weight driven roasting jacks were revolutionary devices for many kitchens around Europe, they were complicated and required a large fireplace to operate.

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Spring driven roasting jacks like the one at the Nelles Manor Museum were a later innovation on the automated rotisserie spit which addressed some of the issues with the weight driven roasting jacks. Created in the 18th century, spring driven roasting jacks use a wind-up clockwork mechanism to turn vertically. They look a bit like bells, but without an opening; on the bottom of the jacks there is always a hook on which anything you would like turned can be hung on. They are smaller than weight driven roasting jacks and are largely self-contained, making them significantly more portable; they can be stored in a cupboard or carried around by hand and can be used with any sized fireplace. Plus, any kind of attachment can be hung on their hooks, making them more versatile. The downside to the spring driven roasting jacks is that they couldn't handle a lot of weight, so they were only used for small cuts of meat.

I always think of the concept of automated, time saving kitchen devices as something that came out of the 19th century, so I was surprised to hear about how far back the history of roasting jacks goes. It really stands out to me, how "modern" this device feels; I feel more connected to the people of the past when I look at it.

Happy 110th Birthday UELAC

Ottawa – May 27, 1914

Act of Parliament (Cha. 146, 4-5) the incorporation of the Loyalist Societies into one body

"The United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada"

The one hundred and thirty years since the Treaty of Separation had seen the growth of a nation, from sea to sea, and a great scattering of the Loyalists descendants. The length and breadth of the new country made it difficult to unite the Loyalist descendants in the common cause of keeping the Loyalist history alive and telling it to their countrymen and to the world. In 1913, the various provincial societies met in Toronto to discuss their future. Col. George A.S. Ryerson strongly advised the delegates that the best solution rested in uniting local and provincial societies into a Dominion of Canada association. This advice was unanimously approved by the delegates, including, Dr. W.O. Raymond, New Brunswick; the Rev. Canon Alfred Brown, Halifax; Mr. George H. Ham, Montreal; Sir John Beverley Robinson, Edgewater, New Jersey; His Honour Hedley Clarence Taylor, Edmonton; Mr. H.S. Seaman, Winnipeg; Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, Vancouver; Lieut. Col. George Alexander Shaw, Sir Alien Aylesworth and Lieut. Col. William Hamilton Merritt, all of Toronto.

The meeting was chaired by Col. Ryerson, and drafted a constitution, to incorporate local and provincial societies into a united body, drawing up a set of by-laws for the purpose. An Act (Chapter 146, 4-5, Geo. V, 1914), May 27, 1914, was passed by the Parliament of Canada. The Prime Minister was Robert Borden. The Act incorporated "The United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada", authorizing its operation in all Provinces and Territories of Canada, and to be controlled under a central body, based in the City of Toronto, Province of Ontario.
